UNR ceremony marks Pearl Harbor Day

Local veterans on Thursday marked Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day, honoring all who died serving in World War II.

Japanese warplanes bombed Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, 65 years ago, sinking American battleships. The surprise attack, which pushed the U.S. into World War II, killed 2,403 peoForce during the Vietnam War.

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3819 conducted a ceremony at the University of Nevada, Reno in the Student Services Building amid a display of 125 model ships from the 1941 U.S. fleet.

The collection is scheduled to be available for public viewing through 5 p.m. today.

"How do we honor our dead?
We honor them by not forgetting," said Reno resident John
Edwards, 59, who was in the Air

Force during the Vietnam War. Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3819 conducted a cere-mony at the University of Ne-

mony at the University of Nevada, Reno in the Student Services Building amid a display of 125 model ships from the 1941 U.S. fleet.

The collection is scheduled to be available for public viewing through 5 p.m. today.

Vietnam veteran Russell Sandlin of Reno said he began collecting model ships in 1981 and adds about a dozen per year. The fleet had 86 warships in 1941, but Sandlin said he has more than one of some models.
